The Feast of Epiphany, Sunday 8th January this year, will mark the beginning of the "Year of the Bible", which is a Diocesan initiative to help us engage with the Scriptures, as individuals and as a church.

The Old and New Testaments are foundational for our faith and its practice. In all our acts of worship we engage extensively with the Bible and so spend a lot of time listening to, and reflecting upon, Holy Scripture.

Consequently, it makes sense that we ought to know more about it. For instance, at the most basic we need to be able to find our way round the Bible, which is like a library of books all in one volume. Would we know where to find I Samuel or 2 Chronicles? Would we know the name of the last book in the Old Testament? Would we know what the Apocrypha is? Refreshing our foundational knowledge will help us to engage with the Bible in our thinking, our worship and our prayer.

As we go a bit deeper, it's helpful to identify (particularly in the Old Testament) what kind of literature we're dealing with - for instance, is it a legal document, history, poetry, worship songs or doctrine and theology? In the New Testament it's illuminating to identify the slightly different presentations of Jesus in each of the Gospels. In reading the Epistles (which are the earliest parts of the New Testament) it is moving to read how Paul wrote about his own spiritual experience of the Risen Christ turning his life upside down, and how the other Epistles shaped the early Church's understanding of Christ and his work of salvation.

At the end of the Year of the Bible, the hope is that we will be more knowledgeable about the Bible; that we will be much more excited about the Bible and so will want to spend more time reading our Bibles; and that importantly we will be more able to make connections between the Bible and our everyday lives and decision-making. So the Year of the Bible will help us to grow in understanding and knowledge, but above all it will help us to grow spiritually. In the words of Thomas Cranmer it is by 'reading, marking, learning and inwardly digesting' the words of Scripture that we are given the resources to share in and live out the life of God.
